

APA CITATION - WEB

The American Psychological Association (APA) citation style is used for writing in the sciences. The manual containing the citation style also discusses writing style. There are many copies at LeDoux library: in the Reference Room, at the Front Desk and at the computers in the Lobby. All copies are for in-library use only. In addition, *Hodges' Harbrace Handbook* also includes a section on APA style. The purpose of this handout is to show examples of the APA citation style for online resources.

When citing a source not covered by the manual or handouts, try to cover the most important elements: author, year of publication, title, and publishing or retrieval information.
